# NEW SEMESTER PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

## 1. INDONESIAN BUSINESS AND COMMERCE SEMESTER PROGRAM

The fourth most populous country on earth behind China, India and the United States, Indonesia is presently the world's 16<sup>th</sup> largest economy (in nominal terms, eighth by PPP) and on track to become the seventh largest by 2030. With 60% of its 253 million people below the age of 30, and extensive mineral, agricultural and other natural resources, Indonesia has the potential to become a major regional and global economic power over the next 15-20 years. As of 2013, Indonesia was Australia's 12<sup>th</sup>-largest trading partner with nearly \$15 billion in two-way trade - most of it in commodities such as wheat, sugar, live animals and aluminium. But with Indonesia's consumer class expected to swell to some 135 million people by 2030, the country's growing demand for consumer goods and services - particularly food, education, financial services, healthcare, ICT and tourism - present significant opportunities for Australian companies and individuals positioned to meet the needs of our rapidly growing northern neighbour.

The Indonesian Business and Commerce Semester Program would allow students to take units in a number of areas offered through the International Undergraduate Program of Gadjah Mada University's AACSB-accredited Faculty of Economics and Business (FEB), in Yogyakarta. Through its International Ungraduated Program, Gadjah Mada's FEB offers a range units taught in English in economics, finance, accounting, management, business administration, and business law. Students would be able to select a full-load of units in accordance with their interests and course parameters of their home university degree.

### Language Study

While the language of instruction for this program will be English, opportunities exist for students to study Indonesian language as part of their semester program, through Gadjah Mada's Indonesian Language and Cultural Learning Service (INCULS). If students wish to undertake language units for academic credit, this can be arranged in consultation and in accordance with the prevailing course regulations at a student's home ACICIS member university.

### Professional Practicum Placement

A unique element of this semester program is the option for students to undertake a related professional practicum placement - either during semester concurrently with their academic studies (one day per week) in Yogyakarta, or in an (four-week) intensive fashion - in Jakarta - immediately following the completion of their semester studies. Practicum host organisations include both local and international business organisations. Opportunities exist for placements in sectors such as banking and finance, creative industries, retail, food and hospitality, infrastructure and mining, small-medium enterprises (SMEs), the Indonesian Stock Exchange and Indonesian Ministries of Finance, Trade and chambers of commerce under the supervision of a workplace mentor.

## 2. INDONESIAN CREATIVE ARTS AND DESIGN SEMESTER PROGRAM

Indonesia is home to millennia-old indigenous traditions of art, design and cultural production, encompassing mediums as diverse as sculpture, woodcarving, painting, textiles, theatre, dance, and music. In the 21<sup>st</sup> century Indonesia is a modern, industrial nation with a burgeoning local film industry, a vibrant domestic fashion industry, growing centres of graphic design, animation, and game-design, and thriving pop, rock and indie music scenes. Only a third of Indonesia's 253 million people are currently connected to the Internet but the country's connectivity rate is presently experiencing double-digit annual growth. Smartphones are ubiquitous amongst Indonesia's expanding consumer class and the country's appetite for social media – already remarkable – also has enormous potential for growth. Centred around established and emerging hubs including Yogyakarta, Bandung, Makassar, Ubud and Jakarta, Indonesia's creative economy is underpinned by a grass-roots DIY culture, numerous arts festivals and community-run arts collectives, as well as by more recent top-down government-sponsored policy initiatives. In 2011, Indonesia's creative industries generated approximately 7% of the country's GDP making the sector one of the top ten largest sectors of the Indonesian economy. With the Indonesian government now actively fostering the development of high-tech start-ups and creative economy SMEs, and courting companies like Apple and Disney to consider relocation of their digital content production to Indonesia, the sector is likely to experience significant expansion over the next decade.

The Indonesian Creative Arts and Design Semester Program would expose Australian students to the vibrancy of contemporary Indonesian art, design and cultural production. The program would allow Australian students to combine academic study with the opportunity to engage in creative production alongside their Indonesian peers. The academic component will involve studying through an ACICIS Indonesian partner university with units available in photography, graphic design, illustration, digital animation, film production, cinematography, production design, and fashion and textiles design. The program will involve Australian students collaborating with their Indonesian peers to produce work including, but not limited to: short films, animations, sound and video art, websites, online installations, blogs and social media apps.

### Professional Practicum Placement

A unique element of this semester program is the option for students to undertake a related professional practicum placement – either during semester concurrently with their academic studies (one day per week), or in an (four-week) intensive fashion immediately following the completion of their semester studies. Practicum host organisations include both local and international business organisations and companies operating in Indonesia's creative economy. Opportunities exist for placements in sectors such as advertising, new media, fashion design, and film and television production under the supervision of a workplace mentor.

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# NEW SHORT COURSE PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

## 3. INDONESIAN LANGUAGE SHORT COURSE

The aim of the Indonesian Language Short Course would be to provide intensive language training to students from beginners to advanced level in Indonesian language. Running in the university vacation periods, the program would either fast-track or supplement a student's language studies or could be taken as an introduction or a 'taster' to the Indonesian language and culture for students exploring an interest in Indonesia.

The program would consist of an intensive Indonesian language and culture course including language tutorials, cultural classes, a variety of seminars and excursions. Students would have the option of participating in a three-week model, held in the July Australian university break, or a six-week model, held in the longer December-January break.

Housed in homestays with local families, the Indonesian Language Short Course would offer participants the opportunity to fully immerse themselves in Indonesian social and cultural life, complementing their formal studies off campus.

#### 4. INDONESIAN CREATIVE ARTS AND DESIGN PRACTICUM PROGRAM

The Creative Arts and Design Practicum Program would expose Australian students to the vibrancy of the contemporary Indonesian arts and cultural production, combining academic elements with hands-on practical creative production experience. The academic components of the program (language classes and industry seminar series) will be hosted by an ACICIS Indonesian partner university. The professional practicum placement will involve Australian students collaborating with Indonesian peers and creative practitioners to produce work including, but not limited to: short films, animations, sound and video art, websites, online installations, blogs and social media apps.

##### Language Classes (40 hours)

Students will undertake an initial two weeks of intensive Indonesian language study at an ACICIS Indonesian Partner University totalling 40 contact hours, at the University's language learning centre. Through this component of the program students will develop language skills that will help them operate more effectively in their practicum placements and in the wider Indonesian community. Classes will be offered at beginner, intermediate and advanced levels and are designed to accommodate a range of language abilities.

##### Industry Seminar Series and Fieldtrips (24 hours)

The Industry Seminar and Fieldtrip component of the program will consist of eight seminars and two fieldtrips totalling 24 contact hours. Students will be required to demonstrate adequate preparation and familiarity with seminar readings through informed contributions to discussions and activities in order to pass this component of the program.

##### Professional Practicum Placement (160 hours)

Following the language study and seminar series at the ACICIS Indonesian partner university, students will undertake a four-week industry placement under the supervision of a workplace mentor. Practicum host organisations will include both local and international companies and organisations operating in Indonesia's creative economy. ## 5. INDONESIAN PUBLIC HEALTH STUDY TOUR

Indonesia is Australia's nearest geographical neighbour, and with a tropical climate and developing economy presents unique opportunities for students to broaden their knowledge and experience of public health issues. The archipelagic nation is prone to natural disasters which have wide-spread impact on the population's health and general knowledge of both communicable and non-communicable diseases is still emerging. The main health concerns for Indonesia currently include tuberculosis, malaria, regular annual outbreaks of dengue haemorrhagic fever and a high rate of HIV cases, with outbreaks of other communicable diseases such as measles, diphtheria and avian influenza common and fatality rates often high. With a rising middle class, lifestyle health issues such as smoking, diabetes and heart disease also present as major public health challenges for the nation.

The Indonesian Public Health Study Tour would serve as a two-week intensive program for public health students (as well as students from related disciplines such as Epidemiology, Occupational Health and Safety, Environmental Health, Health Promotion, Community Health, and Health Sciences) to be run in Indonesia during Australian university vacation periods. The course would provide an introduction to the public health challenges currently facing Indonesia, as well as to existing government, international and community-led initiatives tasked with meeting these challenges. For interested students, it may be possible to combine this tour program with a short (three- or six-week) ACICIS Indonesian language course, as offered at Option 3, above.

The program would be facilitated by a leading Australian academic in the field of Public Health who would also possess specialised knowledge in, and experience of, Indonesia. Working in conjunction with several ACICIS Indonesian Partner Universities, the two week tour would see students visit universities and field sites in Jakarta, Bandung, Yogyakarta, Denpasar, and possibly a fifth location in Eastern Indonesia.

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## 6. VETERINARY SCIENCE PROFESSIONAL PRACTICUM

Indonesia is the second most biologically diverse nation in the world, home to 1,600 species of birds, more than 500 mammal species, 2,000 species of reptile and 8,000 species of fish. It is also home to some of the most rare and endangered animals in the world and provides a unique opportunity for students to observe and learn about exotic species. Infectious animal disease remains a problem in Indonesia, however, with examples of recent outbreaks including highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) and rabies.

Adopting the successful approach of ACICIS' established professional practica (Journalism, Development Studies and Business), ACICIS will expand its suite of practica programs into Veterinary Science. ACICIS' Veterinary Science Professional Practicum (VSPP) would entail a six-week study program, undertaken in Jakarta prior to the commencement of the Australian academic calendar year (January – February). The program, hosted by an ACICIS partner university, would consist of an initial two weeks of intensive Indonesian language instruction and English language lectures by local practitioners and experts in the field of veterinary science, followed by a four-week supervised practicum placement. The placement will give participants the chance to apply the practical skills and understanding they have acquired throughout their studies and put textbook theory and scholarly analysis into practice. The VSPP will be designed for students who have no existing Indonesian language skills. Candidates with existing language skills are, however, welcome.

### Language Classes (40 hours)

Students will undertake an initial two weeks of intensive Indonesian language study, totalling 40 contact hours, at an ACICIS Indonesian Partner University's language learning centre. Through this component of the program students will develop language skills that will help them operate more effectively in their practicum placements and in the wider Indonesian community. Classes will be offered at beginner, intermediate and advanced levels and are designed to accommodate a range of language abilities.

### Industry Seminar Series and Fieldtrips (24 hours)

The Industry Seminar and Fieldtrip component of the program will consist of eight seminars and two fieldtrips totalling 24 contact hours. Students will need to demonstrate adequate preparation and familiarity with seminar readings through informed contributions to discussions and activities in order to pass this component of the program.

### Professional Practicum Placement (160 hours)

Student placements will also be overseen by an appointed academic specialist who will serve as the ACICIS Veterinary Science Practicum Program Officer.

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## 7. AGRICULTURE, FOOD SCIENCE AND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT PRACTICUM PROGRAM

Indonesia is rich in natural resources with the second highest biodiversity of any country in the world. Indonesia is the world's fourth largest producer of nickel and bauxite and the second largest producer of tin and coal. Sharing a strategic waterway with Australia, Indonesia's fish-rich waters also make them one of the biggest seafood producers in the world, with main commodities including tuna, shrimp and seaweed. With 45% of workers in Indonesia engaged in agriculture and 31 million hectares of cultivated land, Indonesia is the third largest producer of rice in the world and also a leading producer of sugarcane, cassava, spices, coffee, cocoa, palm oil and rubber. Despite this, Indonesian agricultural policy is prioritising the diversification of food sources away from cereals, presenting unique challenges for the agriculture and food science sectors. Indonesia is strategically important to Australia as a principal cattle trade partner and has great potential for further bilateral trade partnerships.

ACICIS' Agriculture, Food Science and Resource Management Practicum Program will be a six-week study program, undertaken in Bogor prior to the commencement of the Australian academic calendar year (January – February). The program, hosted by an ACICIS Indonesian Partner University (TBC) will consist of an initial two weeks of intensive Indonesian language instruction and English language lectures by local practitioners and experts in the fields of agriculture, food science and resource management, followed by a four-week supervised practicum placement with a local or international agricultural or resource management organisation. The program will be designed to cater for students with no existing Indonesian language skills. Candidates with existing language skills will, however, be welcome.

### Language Classes (40 hours)

Students will undertake an initial two weeks of intensive Indonesian language study, totalling 40 contact hours, at an ACICIS Indonesian Partner University's language learning centre. Through this component of the program students will develop language skills that will help them operate more effectively in their practicum placements and in the wider Indonesian community. Classes will be offered at beginner, intermediate and advanced levels and are designed to accommodate a range of language abilities.

### Industry Seminar Series and Fieldtrips (24 hours)

The Industry Seminar and Fieldtrip component of the program will consist of eight seminars and two fieldtrips totalling 24 contact hours. Students will need to demonstrate adequate preparation and familiarity with seminar readings through informed contributions to discussions and activities in order to pass this component of the program.

### Professional Practicum Placement (160 hours)

Following the language study and seminar series at an ACICIS Indonesian Partner University, students will undertake a four-week industry placement in an Indonesian host organisation under the supervision of a workplace mentor. Host organisations will include major managing contractors (Cardno Emerging Markets, Coffey), and international and local NGOs such as CIFOR, and the World Agroforestry Centre. Student placements will also be overseen by an appointed academic specialist who will serve as the ACICIS Agriculture, Food Science and Resources Management Practicum Program Officer.
