Project Description

ACICIS' Law Professional Practicum (LPP) entails a six-week study program, undertaken in Jakarta prior to the commencement of the Australian academic calendar year (January – February). The program, hosted by Atma Jaya Catholic University, will consist of an initial two weeks of intensive Indonesian language instruction, and seminars by local legal practitioners and experts, followed by a four-week supervised practicum placement with an Indonesian or international legal firm, government agency, or non-government organisation (NGO). The program offers students the opportunity to gain firsthand experiential knowledge of Indonesia's legal industry, and the Indonesian legal system. The LPP is designed for students who have no existing Indonesian language skills. Candidates with existing language skills will also be welcome.

Selection Criteria

Criteria 1: Outline the desired outcomes of the particular Project and the relevance to the participating Students' field or course of study (300 words, 50%)

Indonesia's legal system is characterised by complexity and pluralism. It is the product of inherited colonial European civic and criminal codes, seventy years of post-independence legal reform under both authoritarian and democratic regimes, as well as often overlapping – bodies of pre-colonial, Islamic, and customary law. With increasingly important commercial, trade, tourism, and security links between Australia and Indonesia, understanding the legal system of Australia's northern neighbour has never been more important. ACICIS' Law Professional Practicum (LPP) provides Australian students with the opportunity to learn about Indonesia's legal system firsthand. Students undertaking ACICIS' LPP are provided with an array of in-class and extracurricular opportunities for improving their linguistic and cultural competence.

The LPP consists of three primary modules: Module 1: Language Course; Module 2: Industry Seminar Series; Module 3: Professional Practicum Placement. Successful completion of the program requires a student to receive a 'pass' grade for all three modules, and attain an assessment of "Satisfactory" on their final academic report. To pass, students are graded by the ACICIS LPP Academic Program Officer, an appointed academic with expertise in Indonesia's legal system.

Students exit the program with experience of the Indonesian legal system and valuable firsthand knowledge of Indonesian legal practice and the environment in which these practices operate. Students also exit the program with (at minimum) a basic functionality in the Indonesian language and a wide network of industry contacts from which to build a lifelong engagement with Indonesia.

Criteria 2: Outline how the institution will manage the Project successfully and engage Students in the project (200 words, 40%)

[INSERT NAME OF YOUR UNIVERSITY] is a member of the Australian Consortium for 'In-Country' Indonesian Studies (ACICIS), which has, since 1995, sent over 2000 students to study at Indonesian institutions of higher learning. ACICIS has developed and will continue to manage and facilitate this Project. ACICIS has 17 in-country staff across Indonesia, at offices in Yogyakarta, Jakarta, Bandung, and Bogor. In-country ACICIS staff will provide on-the-ground support for the Project and for participating students, to ensure positive project outcomes and rewarding educational experiences for participating students.

In addition to the support provided by in-country staff, ACICIS also maintains a permanent national secretariat [and six full-time staff] at The University of Western Australia in Perth dedicated to program promotions and student recruitment. Assisted by an active, nationwide network of member university contacts and alumni, ACICIS routinely conducts vigorous email, social media, and face-to-face promotional campaigns advertising ACICIS study options in Indonesia to students. ACICIS also supports member universities to embed ACICIS study options into degree structures and course curricula. Criteria 3: Describe how the institution will encourage the participation and success of Students from identified disadvantaged backgrounds in the Project. (150 words, 10%)

In recent years ACICIS has accommodated both visually impaired and wheelchair-bound students and made it possible, by virtue of its comprehensive on-the-ground pastoral support, for these students to navigate and study in Indonesia. Families with children and single parents regularly participate in ACICIS programs. ACICIS provides these students with additional assistance in seeking out appropriate housing, providing information and assistance with enrolling children in local schools or playgroups, and has petitioned for special consideration from member universities in cases where the demands of family have disrupted study in Indonesia for single parents. Since its inception ACICIS has been committed to minimising costs for students in order to make study in Indonesia an affordable proposition for all Australian students, even for those from lower socioeconomic backgrounds.

[INSERT NAME OF YOUR UNIVERSITY] students participating in ACICIS' Law Professional Practicum undertake two weeks (40 hours in total) of intensive Indonesian language study at Atma Jaya University's Language Centre. This language instruction, undertaken for 3-4 hours per day, Monday to Friday, is designed to give all students a working knowledge of the Indonesian language sufficient for a student to ask and understand responses to simple questions. Indonesian language units are designed for complete beginners, although advanced language units are also available for students with pre-existing Indonesian language skills.
