Undertake 3-6 weeks of intensive Indonesian language training in Indonesia for academic credit towards your Australian or home university degree.

About the program

The ACICIS Indonesian Language Short Course (ILSC) provides intensive language training to students from introductory to advanced levels in Indonesian language.

A student may undertake this virtual program to fast-track or supplement language studies at their home university, or as a standalone introduction to the Indonesian language for those students exploring a nascent interest in Indonesia.

The program consists of intensive Indonesian language tuition incorporating online language classes and interactive cultural experiences.

ACICIS will run this three-week or six-week virtual program during January-February 2022 and it will be hosted by Satya Wacana University (UKSW) in Salatiga.

What is involved?

- ◆ Three to six weeks of intensive online Indonesian language classes hosted by Satya Wacana Christian University (UKSW); and
- ◆ A series of interactive cultural experiences.
